

Dan led the NLHS Athletic department for 13 years before returning to his high school alma mater (John Glenn) to lead the athletic department in 2007. In his 20 plus years as an MVL AD, he served as league President four times and was the senior AD in the league at the time of his passing.

Beyond his duties at these respective schools, Dan served in many leadership capacities in the MVL, Southeast & East District Athletic Boards and the executive committee of the Ohio Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association, where he was President from 2007-09. Dan served a two year term on the OHSAA Board of Control in 2005-2007 and was voted State Athletic Director of the year by his peers in 2013.

Dan played football, basketball and baseball in high school earning two letters on the grid iron. He found his calling as an athletic administrator and took great pride in this leadership role. Dan was a true ambassador for interscholastic athletics, specifically the lifelong lessons and relationships fostered through athletic competition.

He cherished the lifelong relations that he established in his 13 year career at New Lexington High School, specifically Mr. Leckrone for his guidance and loyal support.

A special thanks to the coaches, teachers, boosters, athletes and district administration for making this time special in his life. Dan was extremely proud of the growth and success of the athletic program at New Lex in his tenure as he strived to make better opportunities for student-athletes.

Bob was a part of great teams that have instilled positive influences and helped him succeed in life and his business. It was easy to put the life lessons he learned on the field into his career. Seals has been a Lumber Jack Logger for the past forty plus years. Bob learned early on it that it takes hard work to reach your goals. The teamwork, discipline, perseverance, work ethic and goal setting are great assets Bob has. Most importantly he was able to finish what he started and learn selflessness from his experiences. These qualities will be with Seals forever and are qualities he instilled in his family.

In 1964, at the age of 11, he received his first Punt, Pass and Kick First Place Championship Award in the competition sponsored by Ford. Bob returned in 1965 to win the award again! Seals continued to work hard and improve his playing skills throughout his career participating in track (discus and Javelin) and football.

From 1968-72 he was a four-year starter on the football team. Bob was chosen First-Team All-Ohio twice, three-time All-SEO and three-time All-MVL award winner. Seals was a member of a State Championship and three MVL Football teams. He was captain of the 1971 team.

In track he was a member of two MVL Championship teams and was a two-year letterman and set the MVL Record in the Discus and Javelin events.

Bob is proud to be former NLHS athlete in which he feels has had and continues to have many great athletes who are qualified to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. He is humbled by his induction into this elite group.

They saw the potential I had as an athlete and always pushed me to be the best I could possibly be, never letting me settle and never giving up on me. Playing football at New Lex made me into a mentally and physically tough athlete and person. It taught me more about life and how to be a man than anything else, and I cannot thank this football program enough for what it did for me.

Like Coach Brown always told us, you have to bleed orange and black. During high school I always thought I knew what that meant. I thought it was just giving everything you had in games and practices, and being able to count on each other as teammates and coaches; but I learned later in life that it was so much more than that.

I never realized how lucky I was to be from New Lex until after I suffered my traumatic brain injury, August 18, 2012. The outpouring of love and support my family and I received from this school and this town was absolutely incredible; and you will never know how much that truly means to me. I will never be able to thank you all enough for what you did for me. To be honest, all you Wycinski Warriors all saved my life. I wouldn't be where I am today if it wasn't for all of the prayers, love, and support I received from all of you; and for that I am eternally grateful. To me that's what bleeding orange and black it all about. It's about having a sense of pride in being from New Lex, a sense of pride in being a member of this tight knit community, and not only do you give everything you have for the team and the school; but you give everything you have for anyone lucky enough to be a part of our New Lexington community.
