Life Is Cool After School

The Project Y.O.U. elementary programs are actively involved in Project Based Learning. Project Based Learning (PBL) is a method of learning through identifying a real-world problem, developing its solution and presenting results using a multimedia approach. They gain knowledge and skills by investigating, collaborating and creating. PBL is student-led and more engaging. The afterschool students have completed three PBL themes and are finishing up the year with a fourth theme.

The first project was "How is our life different than that of the Native Americans?" The students researched Native American jobs, homes, clothing, food, and transportation. Steve Free, a Native American storyteller visited the program and discussed Native American culture. After creating posters, 3-D models and displays, the students shared what they learned during our recent family night.

"Christmas Around the World" was the next PBL project. A fictional character named Globe Trot Scott introduced students to different countries and how each country celebrated Christmas. The students prepared and tasted food, created lanterns and ornaments, did a sandman craft, played the Dreidel game, made gingerbread men, created secret napkin notes and played

drums. To culminate, students and their families attended Wild Lights at the Columbus Zoo in December.

Since students were enamored with the zoo, the next project was "Design A Zoo". Students explored the role of zoo keepers and jobs at the zoo. Students researched zoo animals and created aviaries, aquariums and swamps. Each student chose their favorite zoo animal and developed a 3-D display and a poster of facts about their animal. At Family Night, projects were displayed and students completed crafts and games with their families.

Our final project is investigating the Solar System. The theme kicked off with Professor George Eberts from Ohio University's Astrology Department. His presentation about planets was enjoyed by all. Students will be creating 3-D models, building with recyclable materials and constructing booklets. They will also be writing and recording commercial skits to convince others to visit their planet. Students will create their own props for the puppet shows that they are writing. A culminating event is being planned for the end of April.
